## E.S.L. | ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE

Being able to speak English is a very coveted skill in much of Latin America. That rings true here in Arequipa, as well. Due to Arequipa being a large tourist attraction and the second largest economic center in Peru, speaking English gives many people an advantage when looking for a career. On top of this, university students need to be able to pass a basic English proficiency exam in order to graduate.

As we have considered ways to reach the community immediately around the church, we decided that teaching ESL (English as a Second Language) would be a good way to know and serve our community better. We are located just a stone's throw from a university and also just a few blocks from the heart of downtown Arequipa. Therefore, about 6 weeks ago we begun a "soft opening" for our ESL outreach. With the help of a generous donation by Peace Lutheran Church in Gulf Shores, Alabama, we were able to purchase tables, chairs and



supplies for class that the church desperately needed. Because it was our "soft opening," these initial classes were only open to the congregation of our church. We wanted guinea pigs that we knew would give us honest feedback about how the classes were going.



This past week, we finished this first round of classes, and I think that all of our "students" believe it was a huge success. Even though it was only open to our church family, we ended up with a few extras. Please pray for this ministry as we hope to open it up to the community next year (after a few tweaks are made). Our desire is to genuinely get to know our community and also introduce them to God's Word through English. Specifically, we are hoping to reach the younger generations—many of whom have come to Arequipa from the rural areas to study. These young men and women often do not have close family and friends, and it proves to be a very challenging time for them—emotionally, physically, and spiritually.

We aren't sure what to do about the mindset that our Christian brothers and sisters here have regarding holidays. We want to share with them what it looks like when

loved ones get together in the spirit of Christian love and that it is possible to celebrate a holiday without turning it into a drunken debacle. We enjoyed celebrating Thanksgiving as a team and rejoicing in how God has provided for us this year, and as we go into the Christmas season we want to share with our church how holidays can be about family, celebrating Jesus, and loving our neighbors. But please pray with us as it is a tricky road to navigate, and that we can be a light to our city, and show our Christian and non-Christian neighbors what a Christian holiday can look like, even in Peru.
